Patients And Caregivers Blame Each Other For Care Delays

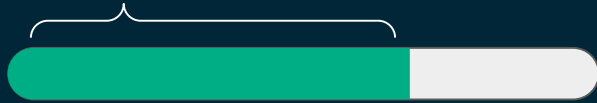
Avoidable readmissions take a financial and mental toll on patients. Tomorrow Health Research's survey findings prove that patients and caregivers are overwhelmed and stressed.

A majority of Americans will eventually need care at home:

35 million

Americans are hospitalized annually, with at least **two-thirds** discharged to **self-care at home**.



\$265 billion of care services will transition to the home by 2025.



20%

of discharged patients get readmitted and many cite the following as a contributing factor:

- ✓ Medical supply complications
- ✓ Delays due to lack of coordination



33%+

of discharged patients transition to **higher cost settings** over the course of the following year.

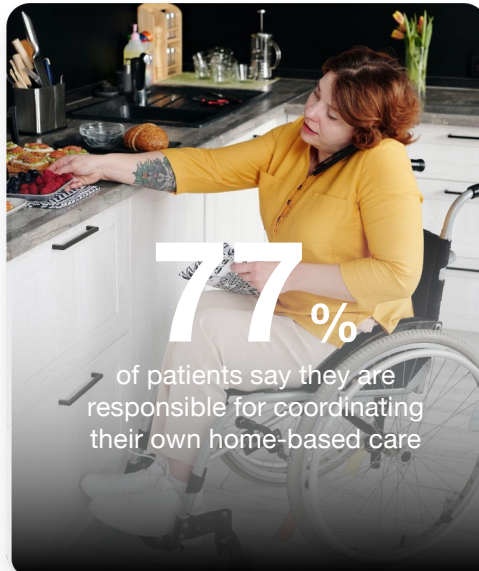

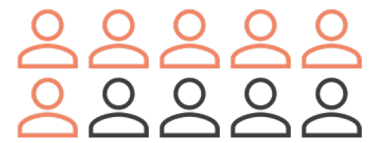
Equally **blame each other** when there is a delay in receiving home-based care.
